Government Relations Message by Association Coordinator Bessie Staab-Hickman

Maryland: I have been contacted by several individuals asking for assistance with the gaming issues. I am more than willing to share any information that could be helpful. Just have no idea of who to share it with. Do you have any government relations persons in your districts? Or any "go to" persons? Before any attempts are made you need to have some things in place for information sharing and etc. It will take all reps working together to be effective. To my knowledge no one has contacted any other Fraternal Organizations in their area. This should be one of your first



priorities you all have the same issues. Second, Maryland has a non-profit coalition in place but it consists of veterans organizations. Find out who their representatives are and propose a meeting, (if my information is correct, at one time Maryland had a coalition of all non-profits.) At the meeting ask to revive the former coalition. Decide what your goals are, then pursue by setting up mini meetings with your government representatives. Make sure you have facts and figures to back up any information given pertaining to donations, and your involvement in the community. I will try to attend any meetings and assist when possible.

Delaware: We have had a few "glitches' implementing our machine usage, some because of rumors and miss-information. Some from a couple of venders who were not privy to a lot of information, they were the last one brought on board. Please ignore and do not spread the rumors. Recently the state lottery office sent out an-email to ask for membership information. We do not give out any information on any member except with permission and to duly authorized persons. This can be considered "Invasion of Privacy". The coalition responded and this resulted in a new e-mail message from the state. YOU DO NOT need to have the membership number notarized each month. Just provide the number of members. THIS INCLUDES CHAPTER MEMBERS. This number determines how many machines you are allowed. The agents are very busy visiting posts and etc, they are targeting NASCAR, weekly books, Queen of Hearts (that game requires a license) sports pools and bingo to mention a few. To date we have not come to any agreement. The form I gave out has been revised. I still believe we need to keep this form for everyone. It gives only the information needed to verify any information you provide for the state. Keep this in a file separate from your other business files. The state does not need to go rummaging through files that do not pertain to them should they visit. We need to be one the same page. The coalition is asking that everyone keep either this form or one like it for this purpose. If I can be of assistance just call or e-mail me.


Kenneth Brown





I will say he was a good Essex member; he was there with his first wife. When she got sick, he stood beside her. When he transferred to Gardenville, I was Administrator of Essex Lodge and remember when he called me and told me why - it was closer for him to go to. I thought that was very upstanding. When he was Governor, he always hired a band for an enrollment. Bill will be missed." *Association President Bryan Shepherd*

"Mr. Bill, or 'Bill', as he made us call him, transferred to Gardenville in March of 2010. He had been coming in for a while, and I would make it a point to announce that we had royalty, a Pilgrim, in the Social Quarters. He hated it when I did that! Anyway, I was talking to him one day about transferring. He told me a 'story' about a Lodge in Florida that did not have a Pilgrim on the rolls and wanted him to transfer there. According to Bill, they were so desperate for a Pilgrim member that they offered him a house as incentive to move! So Bill then asked me what I could offer him to transfer.

Valor Award Recipient Ryan Emmons



After being involved in an accident while the fire truck he was riding on was enroute to a crash on the Outer Loop of the Beltway in Baltimore on January 30, 2013, Ryan Emmons was given eleven surgeries to reattach his severed right arm. Another fire truck had reached the scene of an auto accident and advised Ryan's truck they were not needed. As the fire truck was leaving, it was struck behind by a tractor trailer which pushed the fire truck about 180 feet. The

fire truck then smashed into a concrete barrier and landed on its side. Six other people, including two firefighters, were also injured in the crash and released from the hospital.

Ryan's right arm at the elbow was severed in the crash and he endured the 11 surgeries to reattach it at the elbow. When the fireman driving the fire truck advised that the crash was coming, Ryan thought it was just another car crash in the middle of the night. The other firemen had the presence of mind to save Ryan's arm and put in on ice in time to get him to the hospital. At the present time, Ryan can move his fingers a little bit, but cannot feel anything. There will be more surgeries and, hopefully, these will help his arm to recover fully from the accident.
