

From the Desk of MD-DE-DC Regional Manager Dave Greenaway

Take the Time - Please

I had written about our economic plight with everything going up in price, including the ABCD, but I am going to save that for another issue. I just got off the phone with a widow of a 50-year member. He was a member of the **25 Club** and she is a Collegian. She probably will not renew her dues. Our conversation made me realize that this is an important topic. As we struggle to gather new members and retain those that we have, incidents like these can do irreparable damage to the perception that we are a caring Fraternity of men and women.

I am disturbed, embarrassed and confounded by a recent letter and a phone call from a daughter and a widow of former LOOM Brothers. It seems that after over 30 years of paying dues and supporting the Moose Family Fraternity, their Moose Brothers could not send a card of condolence to the widows and their family, upon their recent passing.

Has this ever happened in your Lodge or Chapter? In one instance the Lodge BOO never received the death notification from the family. An honest mistake, but unfortunately in most cases it is just the lack of a policy concerning the death of one of our members. Does your Lodge have a box of cards at the bar? It is simple to pull out a card when a member delivers the news that one of our members is sick or has passed away. Pass it around the room and mail it off in a couple of days. This act of kindness takes no more time, than it takes for caring members to affix their signatures to the card.

It may seem a mundane chore to the living; but neglect to perform this simple act of condolence, and a lifetime of service and continued support of a deceased member goes for nothing. His or her family becomes bitter, because what meant so very much to the deceased means nothing to the living members that he/she called Brother or co-worker. One member's daughter wrote "We were very disappointed during his services that there was no contact from the Moose. My Dad would have been very hurt because he was so proud to be a member of the Moose, and always told us that if anything ever happened to him - the Moose would be there to help! That's why he paid dues for over 30 years." His Lodge never sent a card.

The other widow called to tell me that the lodge Governor, when asked to extend a <u>Service of Tribute</u> at the funeral home did not have enough men or enough time. How would you feel if your father or husband had paid his dues for 50 years and you were told that we did not have time for him? I know that both, the wife and the daughter are bitter. I know that these families are disillusioned about their Fathers' belief in the "defending circle". I know that I listened to one widow for over an hour trying to find a redeeming virtue of our Family Fraternity. I know that I sympathized with her for not finding a redeeming quality in her husband's present day lodge Brothers and officers.

Eventually our families are going to need the support of friends, immediate family and our Moose Brothers and Co-Workers. Imagine how your surviving spouse will feel if no one sent a card or attended a viewing. Imagine if their simple request for a ten-minute **Service of Tribute** was denied because Lodge or Chapter members did not have time. One deceased member and his spouse had time to attend Lodge and Chapter meetings and drive countless miles to District meetings for scores of years. Is this the legacy of the Moose Family Fraternity we want our survivors to witness?

It would be **Beyond Belief** for me to believe that we, the greatest fraternal organization in the Free World, would condone such neglect for our survivors. Please do not allow your Lodge or Chapter ever be guilty of not having enough time, or simply not caring to make the time. In two unintentional, unthinking and selfish situations, a Lodge has crushed the goodwill and good works of each lodge, in the eyes of our deceased Brother's families and friends. Please do not let this happen in your Lodge, Chapter or Moose Legion. Have a plan to recognize when a member is ill or has passed away.

Thanks for all that you do for Mooseheart, Moosehaven and your Communities.

To Show You What Dave's talking about:

This is a progression of emails showing how our Regional Manager handled a very delicate situation. The family member of a deceased Brother emailed Bill Airey. Mr. Airey forwarded the email to Dave and here you can see Dave's response in this situation. The final message is sent from Mr. Airey to the other Regional Managers commending Dave for his handling of this unfortunate occurrence.

Dear Mr. Airey:

I am writing regarding my father's Moose membership -

My father was a dues-paying member for over 30 years. He passed away on October 18, 2007. At that time, we contacted his local Lodge to notify them of his passing. They took down the information. Since notifying them, we have heard nothing - no card, no condolences, no representation at his viewing or funeral, no calls to my mother - nothing! That was until we received a notice to pay his dues by June 30, 2008. I returned that notice advising them of exactly what I just wrote above to you. Still we have heard nothing - until today when we received a reminder notice to pay his dues or his membership would expire. I will return that notice with the same note.

I would ask that you please take whatever action is necessary to stop sending notices to him. We were very disappointed during his services that there was no contact from the Moose. My Dad would have been very hurt because he was so proud to be a member of the Moose, and always told us that if anything ever happened to him - the Moose would be there to help! That's why he paid dues for over 30 years. It is just very hurtful and angers me when I receive them.

Thank you for your attention to this matter.

I am sorry to hear of your father's passing, and I apologize for the lack of communication from the Family Center. I contacted the Junior Past Governor and the Administrator and explained your situation. Notification of your father's passing was not given to either officer by whomever took your message about his passing. The Family Center has a reputation of sending cards and visiting their ill and shut in members, when they are aware of a particular situation.

I understand that this does not turn back the clock to October. The lodge will strive to have a better notification system. They are now using a notification book in the Social Quarters. Your particular situation and that of a call today from a recently widowed member, has compelled me to send a message to our lodges via our Association's quarterly newsletter "The Association Communicator". In writing this message, I hope that all 50 Lodges and 46 Chapters in Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia, will examine their handling of bereavement and illness policies, so that these oversights are not repeated. I have attached a copy of my open letter to this e-mail. Your letter was part of my inspiration, and with your permission, I would like to have it published in our upcoming edition.

Your family should receive no more notices from Moose International. Your father's record was updated June 23, 2008. Again, please accept my sincere condolences and apology.





On top of that, she has given her niece, Heather, the motherly care and attention that she so needed while growing up. In addition, Shirley has been more than a grandmother to her grandson, Steven. He will have a lifetime of memories of the quality of time spent with his grandmother. She continues to be there for him with warm hugs, lots of patience and endless love. After the launching of the new "Safe Surfin" program and with our Association needing the support of our legislators to get some bills passed to protect our youth, now is the perfect time to get to know your legislators, local, state and national. Lots of information from national is available and how successful this and other programs will be is your participation. ONE HUGE REQUEST, please will the District Presidents share the

name, e-mail, and phone number of their chairman with me? Officials do not bite, they are user friendly if approached with the right attitude and you have good information. I think we, at least, in this Association have found this to be true.

Maryland - have any of you pursued the issue of having a designated area or place on your grounds to provide for smokers, this was still pending in your legislature. Have you gathered any data of how much it will cost in revenues if some members are not provided such option? You still have a chance, let's say last ending, score tied, two outs, one to bat. You can either strike out with not trying to swing, or take the chance on really swinging away and knock it out of the park. Guidelines, be a resident of the state, have served at least 90 days, been discharged after June 29, 2004, send a copy of DD214 papers as proof of military status, proof may be faxed, internet or mailed. I do not know if Maryland or D.C. has a similar program but it's worth a checking.

There has been a lot of publicity about the eminent domain amendment, keep a close eye, this has not gone away, this still has shark's teeth. It's still very much alive, only the approach has been changed now it states good for public use not private contractors. Please tell me when areas are to be developed, who will do the developing and therefore reap profits? Even if eventually it is for public use and I know it states raising bonds and etc. who will benefit most? No, this issue is far from resolved, it's just a slight concession to those who are strenuously opposing the taking of their properties under the current guidelines. 



The foundation is an offshoot of the Internet Crimes Against Children Federal Task Force based out of the Bedford County Sheriff's Department directed by Sheriff Mike

Brown. The three basic functions of the foundation are: criminal apprehension and prosecution, legisla-

tive advocacy to enact mandatory laws for Internet Safety education and education of students and parents utilizing the NetSmartz software program. The Foundation uses celebrity spokespeople, such as actor Erik Estrada, who came to the Convention in Las Vegas and is in the photo to the right with Camden-Wyoming Jr. Regent Ann Barnes, Shaquille O'Neal, Oakland Raiders center Jack Grove and fighter Diego Sanchez. The overall goal is to provide NetSmartz software to school districts throughout North America and, eventually Canada.
