A Letter of Concern to All Lodge Officers

My Brothers:

For the last couple of years we have been reviewing hundreds of emails, letters, notes and phone calls from members, indicating their concern over the lack of 'customer service' being received at Lodges. While we agree that we do lose some members because of the Lodge Smoking Policy, or because they are unhappy with one policy or another issued by the House Committee, for the most part it appears that we have failed to deliver the product we sold.

- We said we had a calendar filled with activities for ALL ages
- We said we were the friendliest place in town
- We said we assisted members during times of loss
- We said we visited members in the hospital
- We said members were our most important asset
- We said we existed to serve Mooseheart and Moosehaven
- We said that our operations were centered around the needs and desires of our membership and not those who
 participated in our programs as guests
- We said that our facilities were clean and bright and safe
- We said that the outside appearance of our Moose Homes were inviting and well-maintained
- We said we existed to make our community a better place to raise our familes
- We said we were fraternal meaning we really care for others in need
- We said we were family oriented
- We said we wanted every qualified resident of our community to become part of our Moose family
- We said we operated on a basis of 'one for all and all for one'
- We said membership retention was important to our program of maintaining our defending circle We said membership was the lifeblood of our Order

If the above statements are true, then why do we not see membership on the rise in every one of our fraternal operations? The reason appears to be because, in too many instances, we operate for ourselves and not for the general membership. Keeping our members happy does not seem to be our number one priority.

This being the case, why haven't you registered your bartender, your wait staff, your Social Quarters Manager to attend the 'Bringing Home the Bacon' seminar in Las Vegas this November? This seminar will focus on providing the necessary customer service – in our case – member service – necessary to retain members and obtain new members at a faster rate. Your Lodge NEEDS to be represented.

You should consider the cost of attendance to be an investment in the future of your fraternal operation. Would you spend \$1,000.00 if you felt you would double or triple the income from your social quarters operation over the next year; increase membership production; improve membership retention? If you wouldn't, perhaps you need to question if you, as an officer, understand your responsibility to the members who elected you to serve. In addition, what a perk for your employee(s) to have your board feel they should be sent to Las Vegas to attend the seminar because you appreciate the job they are delivering and feel they can bring back methods to improve your overall operation.

Please see that this is read at your next Lodge Officer's or House Committee Meeting and then select the person you feel will best represent the interest of your Lodge and register them online at www.mooseintl.org. You will be doing what you were elected to do – serve the best interest of your fraternal operation.

Moose Chocolate Galore!!!






The young fellow in the photo on the left is a soldier who is in rehab at Walter Reed Hospital. He








Convention was great, the mayor was very much taken with our organization and all it's good work, he has asked if it's possible to receive a copy of our Communicator. Lori James from Senator Carper's office is always a delight and Kevin Smith, from Senator Biden's office, said right up until the Secret Service settled in at Senator Biden's home there was still a possibility he could have made it to our joint session. At any rate some

of us met with them along with Andy Dooley and Jack Mowatt, the representatives from Safe Surfin' and the softball league just before our joint session. They were interested enough to stay until they finished hearing what these folks had to say, they could easily have read their letters, gave a greeting and gone on their way, now you have their attention!!!! They will help spread the word to get some National Legislation started for our Safe Surfin' project.

The challenge to you is how many legislators in your area can you get on board to push this project, does the state of Maryland have one? How about the District of Columbia? Delaware does have a Child Predator Unit in place it was one of the first things our Attorney General Beau Biden (Joe's son) introduced and had passed (want

We have a much needed project to work with and we need the good will of legislators from all areas - local, state and national - to get legislation with real teeth and consequences on the books.

In this year of elections it takes very little effort to have the ones running for office visit your lodge. In every issue of the Communicator I see where lodges and chapters have honored a law enforcement officer, a firefighter, had a project and donated monies to various associations, groups, or individuals with a need, heart, MS, cancer, schools - the list is endless. You held dances, dinners, flea markets, raffles and many other projects to raise the funds you are donating. Keeping this in mind WHY ARE THERE NO CITY, COUNTY, STATE, LOCAL OR NATIONAL LEGISLATORS IN A PICTURE? WHY, RARELY IF EVER IS THERE ANYTHING IN ANY NEWSPAPER, STATE, LOCAL OR EVEN THE SMALL COMMUNITY PAPERS? Could it possibly be they were NOT invited, or if they were and no news media came and you did not take a picture, write a small article and submit it to the news media? They need good news to print. This goes a long way of sending out a message of how valuable an asset we are, we have "something going on", do you think it would help us gain members? Washington is back in session, as is our state governments, so start checking out the bills they have pending see if it should be of concern and follow through, if you aren't sure ask the question. Make sure you add your input, concerns and questions before legislation is passed.

Essex Moose Lodge #70 & Chapter #783 Sell Flight 93 Ties & Scarves at The Harley-Davidson/Buell Store of Baltimore's 7th Annual "Ride to Remember"

No motorcyclist needs a reason to ride. In fact no motorcyclist needs to pay to ride their own motorcycle! But approximately 1200 Baltimore motorcycle enthusiasts gladly handed over a \$30 donation to participate in the September 23, 2007 "Ride To Remember". The ride is the brain child of Jim Foster, owner of The Harley-Davidson/Buell Store of Baltimore. Jim, his employees, and a handful of volunteers began this annual motorcycle ride less than two weeks after the 9/11 terrorist attacks. In the aftermath, it seemed that the focus was on the twin towers and Penta-



gon, so the proceeds of the first ride went to The American Red Cross Relief Effort. Proceeds from the second and third rides were donated to the Flight 93 memorial fund. The proceeds of subsequent ride events have been donated to various veterans support groups to aid our men and women who have served.

With their emotions in high gear, motorcyclist roared from three different staging areas to complete a 52 mile circuit around Baltimore's Beltway. As they rode, the memories riding through the minds of the motorcyclists, residents of the surrounding area, fire and police personnel were the awful vestiges of the twin towers collapsing, pentagon in flames and the lonely smoldering Pennsylvania field. The memory of the silent skies in the following days of the attacks was louder than the 1200 revving V-Twin engines circling the Beltway Sunday afternoon. Riding every make and model of motorcycle from
